FOREWORD

Protecting consumers and honest businesses sits at the heart of everything we do across Trading Standards. It is clear consumers need us more than ever as financial pressures push innocent victims into the hands of unscrupulous criminals looking to profit from their worries. However, I'm pleased to say the work of my Trading Standards colleagues has not faltered. Despite a financial squeeze on operational budgets, they've built on last year's successes to provide even more consumer and business protection at the same cost to the taxpayer.

In the past year, NTS teams and workstreams dealt with £92.1 million in consumer and business detriment. As a result of the hard work of Trading Standards colleagues, prison sentences totalling just over 103 years were handed down - more than double last year's. Courts awarded victims £363,900 in compensation. And we are still saving taxpayers £11.60 for every £1 we have spent since 2014.

But that's not all. This year we were able to reap the reward for several years of chasing down criminals operating a complex energy contracts scam of small businesses. This landmark investigation, which involved a powerful and high-profile individual in the North West, saw the defendants sentenced to a combined total of 26 years imprisonment. A truly outstanding result for our colleagues in Trading Standards North West, who led on the investigation.

Add to this our work to disrupt a multimillion-pound fraud involving interconnected call centres selling misleading white goods warranties, insurance, home improvement products and loss claim management schemes. In this case, our work led to over 11,800 cancelled direct debits with estimated savings of £2.8m.

This year, illicit and underage sales of vapes remain a priority and we are proud of Trading Standards' work so far to disrupt this industry. Data collected as part of Operation Joseph, a

National Trading Standards initiative funded by the Department for Health and Social Care, revealed that England's local authority Trading Standards services seized almost 1.2 million illegal vapes in 2023-2024 – an increase of 59% on the previous year.

There is no doubt that we will face challenges as we continue to disrupt the illicit tobacco trade here in the UK. Operation CeCe, a project funded by HMRC, saw local authorities seize £11.8m of illicit tobacco showing the scale of the problem. Alongside this, mass marketing and cold calling scams, doorstep crime, fair trade issues, estate and lettings, eCrime and animal feed work will remain among our top priorities.

Now more than ever, as we continue to navigate financially challenging times and prepare for a new Government, we are committed in our efforts to identify, support and protect consumers against those who seek to exploit them. As I have said previously, measuring our impact here is harder but it is the most valuable thing we do.

A SNAPSHOT OF OUR WORK IN 2023/24



HOW WE WORK

This document provides a snapshot of the work of National Trading Standards in 2023/2024. We allocate Government funding to tackle high priority national and regional Trading Standards issues in England and Wales. This is separate to the bulk of day-to-day Trading Standards activity delivered by local authorities across England and Wales. Our vision is to protect consumers and safeguard businesses through cross-boundary, intelligence-led enforcement. We do this by:

- · Supporting specialist teams that cover a range of issues
- Funding local authorities to deliver specific work in priority areas

focusing on secondary ticketing, 'copycat' web sites, technical support helplines and social media advertising fraud.

Supported 21 local authority/agency investigations.

SCAMS



Made savings of £44,880,545 through investigations and disruption work.



Over **43,500** pieces of mail were returned to the sender or otherwise disrupted this year, each containing an estimated average of £37.



Friends Against Scams recruited a further 21,490 'friends' to help in the fight against scams – supporting them educate themselves and those around them on how to spot a scam.



For every £1 spent the team have saved £66.31.

NTS IN ACTION



Disrupting fraud

The Scams Team disrupted a multimillion-pound fraud operated by interconnected call centres selling misleading white goods warranties, insurance, home improvement products and loss claim management schemes.

The Team's disruption strategy resulted in the removal of office, banking and tax filing facilities from a number of companies, leading to over 11,800 cancelled direct debits with estimated savings of £2.8m. Refunds were secured for eight consumers amounting to £67,800.

Work with telecoms providers led to 740 telephone numbers being barred. These numbers had been used to make 7.8 million mass marketing fraud calls in one quarter – costing consumers an estimated £7.8 million.

INTELLIGENCE

The NTS Intelligence Team set out the priorities for the NTS strategic assessment, including doorstep crime and cold calling, lettings (England only), mass marketing fraud/scams, illicit and underage sale of vapes (England only), illicit tobacco, used cars, intellectual property, other fair-trading issues, estate agency and animal feed work.



Produced **four** tactical assessments, **four** intelligence reports, **four** scoping/research documents and **one** briefing document.



ESTATE & LETTING AGENCY







Launched the final tranches of the material information guidance for industry in November 2023, helping to ensure more people have all the necessary information they need before buying or letting a property.

Issued five warning orders under the Estate Agents Act and six penalty charge notices for non-compliance with Redress Schemes.









Supported nine projects seeking to improve letting enforcement in England, liaising with 49 authorities across six regions.



Responded to over 1,300 requests for advice and assistance.



10 fines were issued under the Tenant Fees Act. **845** people completed Estate and Letting Agency Team training on property crime and intelligence



REGIONAL INVESTIGATIONS TEAMS



At the end of 2023/2024, the Regional Investigations Teams had 109 open cases, having brought 39 cases to a conclusion during the year.



ILLICIT TOBACCO

As part of Operation CeCe, a project funded by HMRC, local authorities seized illicit tobacco with a revenue value of £11.8 million.



ILLEGAL VAPES

Data collected as part of

Local TS teams made 3,385 underage test purchases of vapes with a sales rate of 26% - representing a 174% increase in underage vapes test purchasing.

DOORSTEP CRIME



A criminal who misled customers into paying for building works by giving false information was sentenced to five years in prison and given an indefinite Criminal Behaviour Order. The investigation team identified 60 victims who between them lost £660,000.

USED CARS



A renowned car clocker was jailed for reducing displayed mileages on 33 vehicles by 2.75 million miles and falsifying service histories to hide it. The criminal benefitted by £585,600, received 57 months imprisonment and was ordered to pay £64,853 in compensation to victims.



Two criminals recieved a total of 22 months imprisonment for their part in a £350,000 car clocking scam. Judge Edwards thanked those involved for the "monumental amount of work on the case".

ENERGY RELATED FRAUD

Eight energy-related cases were heard in court.

25 defendants were sentenced for their role in the mis-selling of energy contracts and energy saving products/services to vulnerable customers.



NTS IN ACTION



Cracking down on energy related fraud and securing compensation for victims

A landmark investigation that ran for several years concluded with more than 26 years of prison time handed to four defendants for their role in a complex scam that saw small business owners deceived into signing long-term energy contracts at vastly inflated prices. Three were banned from being company directors for a total of 31 years. Nine more recieved suspended sentences totalling more than seven years and were ordered to carry out 650 hours of unpaid work. The successful result was secured by the National Trading Standards Regional Investigation Team (North West) and Trading Standards North West. £99,787 in compensation for victims was secured.
